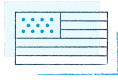


Maintaining a strong relationship between the U.S. and the United Nations

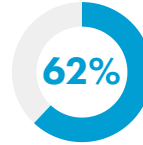

Standing up for the UN and the vital work it is doing around the world is a point of pride and unity. A majority of Americans in Iowa support the work that the United Nations does globally.

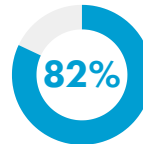
